

MANERE IN DILECTIONE CHRISTI—"TO ABIDE IN THE LOVE OF CHRIST"

In keeping with the school's motto, Manere in Dilectione Christi—**"To abide in the love of Christ"**—all members of the Archbishop McCarthy High School community are committed to following the example of Christ as revealed in the Gospels. In John 13:35, Jesus Christ tells his disciples, "This is how all will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." The expression of our school's devotion to the teachings of our Lord Jesus Christ comes

in different forms. Foremost among these is participation in the Liturgy. School Masses are held monthly; other milestones, including the blessing of class rings for juniors and the senior class graduation, are also celebrated with Masses.

Class retreats also strengthen the Christ-centered atmosphere of our school. Every grade level has its own retreat that helps students explore and deepen their relationship with God.

SPIRITUAL FORMATION & COMMUNITY MINISTRY

Freshmen attend the Genesis retreat on campus at the beginning of the school year, enabling these new students to build a better relationship with God and with each other. Sophomores have their own retreat, Antioch, and the Transfiguration retreat is for juniors. Both of these retreats are held at a camp in rural central Florida; the peaceful natural environment is free of distractions and facilitates students' spiritual growth and renewal. Seniors attend the Pentecost



retreat in February as they approach the end of their years at Archbishop McCarthy.

All of these retreats provide opportunities for learning, reflection, prayer, and bonding, giving students the time and space to strengthen their relationship with God. Students look forward to attending these retreats, especially after the pandemic resulted in their suspension for two years. So popular are the retreats that Antioch and Transfiguration are offered twice, once in each semester. Also, many students become trained peer ministers who help plan and conduct the activities that students find so spiritually enriching.

Service to the community, especially those with the greatest needs, is another essential component of the Catholic atmosphere at Archbishop McCarthy. All students are encouraged to put their faith into action and follow Jesus' example of service and sacrifice; many of them go above and beyond what is expected, sharing their time, talent, and treasure in a variety of activities.

For example, the McCarthy chapter of Best Buddies International, whose mission is to serve those with intellectual and developmental disabilities, participated in the Broward Friendship Walk in April and raised \$8,500 for the organization. Mavs for Heroes raised funds and sent thank-you cards to South Florida veterans participating in the Honor Flight Network. Members of the Maverick clubs Loving Souls and Be the Light collected nearly 15,000 pairs of new and gently-used shoes for the homeless *served by Camillus House*.

> As a Catholic school, Archbishop McCarthy recognizes that service to others is absolutely central to its mission of Catholic youth formation. Jesus Christ tells his disciples in John 13:34: "As I have loved you, so you also should love one another." Perhaps there is no time during the school year when Christ's new commandment is embraced more fully than on Maverick Movie Night. As the name of the event states, Maverick Movie Night is an evening when the Archbishop McCarthy community gathers to watch a film together-"for the sake of camaraderie and good clean fun," in the words of Student Activities **Director Ms. Claudia Curtis.**

But in fact Movie Night has become one of the biggest fundraisers on the school calendar, whose goal is to raise money for a family in need. **"It is a three-month labor of love," says Ms. Curtis, "in which students, teachers, coaches,**

teams, and clubs—basically everyone on campus—collaborate to create magic for a worthy cause." This year's beneficiaries are the MacEwen family, who, in the course of a year, have had to cope with the sudden loss of 15-year old Knox in his freshman year of high school and his mother's cancer diagnosis and treatment regimen. McCarthy's Link Crew, led by moderators Mrs. Monica Arango and Mrs. Melissa Chriswisser, with

assistance from Ms. Curtis, runs the event, which this year included 15 games, 5 food booths, a raffle, an auction, and the always-popular dunk tank, in addition to a big-screen showing of Monsters, Inc. The challenge of hosting so many activities was made even more difficult by bad weather; heavy rain throughout the week, including on the day of the event, forced a last-minute move to the school gym. But the rain could not dampen the spirits of the organizers and attendees. "The turnout was tremendous," Mrs. Chriswisser stated proudly. "Our family really needed an evening like this," Mrs. MacEwen noted. In addition to the money earned on Movie Night, candy and t-shirt sales in the weeks before the event raised funds and promoted the event. Local restaurants hosted a "MacEwen Family Night," donating a percentage of sales to this worthy cause. "Maverick Movie Night is an act of grace; it is faith in action," Ms. Curtis observes.

In John 12: 26, Jesus tells us that "whoever serves me must follow me, and where I am, there also will my servant be." God's presence was surely felt by all who came to Maverick Movie Night. Congratulations to Father Andrew Vitrano-Farinato, a member of the Archbishop McCarthy Class of 2014, on his ordination to the priesthood. Archbishop Thomas Wenski administered the sacrament of Holy Orders at the Cathedral of St. Mary on May 13, 2023.

We ask God to bless Father Vitrano-Farinato on his journey as he works to bring people closer to Jesus.



Father Vitrano-Farinato attended St. Mark Catholic School and was always involved in parish activities. He cites the kindness and understanding of his teachers at St. Mark as one of the inspirations that led him to the priesthood. Witnessing the ministry of the priests at St. Mark, where his grandfather was a deacon, made him think that he too could devote his life to serving others.

After graduating from Archbishop McCarthy, Father Vitrano-Farinato went directly to the seminary. After his ordination in 2023, he was appointed to St. Louis Parish in Pinecrest, where he serves as Parochial Vicar.

Father Vitrano-Farinato has said that he wants to be a priest who attracts people not to himself but to Jesus. He wants to help others understand that no matter their faults, they too can experience Christ's unconditional love and boundless mercy just as he has.

Women's Soccer at Archbishop McCarthy has long been one of the school's most successful athletic programs; year after year, the team is in the running for the state title.



The team's winning record on the pitch is matched by their outstanding record of service to the community. The girls take on a number of projects throughout the year aimed at helping those with the greatest needs. Head Coach Mike Sica puts it this way, "We place a high value on cultivating well-rounded student athletes. Our players know that we take soccer very seriously, but it is not all that we are about. We have a set of core values that we live by and one of them is 'Always be grateful for what you have and appreciate being a part of this team. Never forget it is a privilege and not a right to be a Maverick Soccer Player." With that privilege comes the responsibility as Catholic Christians to follow Jesus' commandment to love one's neighbor as oneself.

The women's soccer team conducts food and toy drives at Thanksgiving and Christmas and assists in various school-wide fundraising



projects throughout the school year. The team's commitment to service continues in the summer months also. At the four summer soccer camps held on campus this summer, the athletes, the campers, and the campers' families collected **1,800 pounds of found for The Pantry of Broward**, an organization that McCarthy's women's soccer teams have been supporting since 2012. The Pantry serves senior citizens in need throughout Broward **County** who are living on low incomes as well as grandparents who are raising their grandchildren. **In the past 12 years, the women's soccer program has collected over 15,000 pounds of food for the Pantry.**

Coach Sica states proudly, "When given the opportunity, our athletes will help others in any way we can. We have a higher purpose other than just winning."

The National Athletic Honor Society

"The National Athletic Honor Society is an organization that recognizes, supports, and rewards high school student-athletes who achieve excellence in the classroom and on the field of play. We encourage and promote good citizenship, sportsmanship, competition, moral character, and friendship among outstanding academic and athletic achievers in high school."



On April 17, Archbishop McCarthy inducted 86 scholar-athletes into the National Athletic Honor Society. To qualify for membership, these elite juniors and seniors must have played two full seasons on a Varsity team while maintaining a minimum overall grade point average of 4.5 and fulfilling their service hour requirements. Athletic Director Karen Frank, in congratulating these student-athletes on their outstanding accomplishments, noted that the Catholic education they receive in the classroom continues on the fields and courts where they play the sports they love.

Archbishop McCarthy's 2024 National Merit Scholarship Finalists

Achieving the status of Finalist in the National Merit Scholarship competition, perhaps the most prestigious academic honor for a high school senior, is no easy task. In the fall of their junior year, about 1, 300,000 high school students throughout the United States take the PSAT, the qualifying test for a National Merit Scholarship. Of that group, only about 15,000 students attain Finalist status—about 1% of all juniors who took the test that year. National Merit Scholarship Finalists are among the most sought-after students by the nation's elite universities and become eligible for a host of valuable academic scholarships.

The Maverick asked the Archbishop McCarthy Class of 2024's five National Merit Finalists how their high school education has helped them achieve their goals.

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collapsed in the dugout. A scan of his brain revealed that he had suffered a ruptured aneurysm that required immediate surgery. Amazingly, after 18 days in intensive care and just six weeks after surviving what is often a fatal injury, Danny had recovered well enough to throw out the ceremonial first pitch for the White Sox on June 1, 2018. In 2019, Danny retired as a player and began his career in coaching. When asked about how his years at Archbishop McCarthy shaped his character, Danny says that "the structures and standards he learned at McCarthy helped him prepare for his future as a husband, father, and athlete." Danny credits his coaches at Archbishop McCarthy for teaching him that "caring and authenticity are the best ways to unlock a person's potential." Danny's courage and determination in overcoming adversity serves as inspiration

serves as inspiration for all Mavericks.

Seattle Mariners Assistant Pitching Coach Danny Farquhar graduated from Archbishop McCarthy in 2005. Why did he choose McCarthy? "It was a brand new school that offered an environment and opportunities I could thrive in," recalls Danny. Though McCarthy was a young and relatively small school at the time, its baseball program achieved success quickly. Danny, playing as both an outfielder and pitcher, immediately excelled: As a sophomore, he batted .436, and his ERA was .89 in his senior year. He continued his baseball career at the University of Louisiana at Lafayette and was drafted by the Toronto Blue Jays in 2008. After playing for several major league teams, Danny joined the Chicago White Sox in 2017. And it was in Chicago that Danny faced the greatest challenge of his life. On April 20, 2018, after pitching in a game against the Houston Astros, Danny

the boys played a tough schedule against top-ranked teams and were wellprepared for their playoff run. A highlight of their season was beating the 2023 State Champion powerhouse Southwest High School Eagles in four sets on their home court. Coach Perez looks forward to the 2025 season, pointing out that "we have a strong core returning next year, and we are confident that we will have another successful playoff run."





The Lady Mavericks Softball team, playing their home games on a new, state-of-theart turf field, enjoyed their most successful season ever, winning the District and Regional championships and making it to the State Championship round for the first time in school history.

Led by the Miami Herald's Broward Softball Coach of the Year Jeanne Ferrier, the team saw several of its players, Sienna Garcia, Chantale Guillou, and Izabel Baron, earn first-team honors on the Sun-Sentinel and Miami Herald's All-County teams; Gianna Dilella and Cheyenne Griffin were selected for the Herald's second team. Coach Ferrier, aided by colleague Jan-Marie Meadows and assistants Darryl Hartung and John Trageser, described the 2024 season as an "amazing experience" for the team.



"The support we received from Athletic Director Karen Frank, President Richard Jean, and Principal Kevin Molina was more than anyone can ask," Coach Ferrier noted appreciatively. The winning tradition of Archbishop McCarthy's baseball teams continued, as the Varsity squad finished the season as runner-up in the Regional tournament. Four Maverick seniors received scholarships to continue their baseball careers in college. Among the outstanding performers were Greg Caban, with a season batting average of .460; and Stephen Joyce, who struck out 80 batters in 60 innings pitched, with an ERA of 1.5.





The Women's Flag Football team, though young and lacking experience, finished their season as Regional Semi-finalists. Coach John Anfuso is optimistic about the future of his team, pointing out that as the popularity of flag football continues to grow, "more students will want to play the sport, and our school will continue to be competitive." Junior Gianna Paul set a school record for punt return yardage in a season; she also returned two punts in one game for a total of 125 yards.

Three of McCarthy's Track and Field athletes qualified for the state competition—Helen Ribas in the 1600 and 3200 meters; George Sterr in the triple jump and javelin; and Arhuncito Volmar in the high jump and the long jump. Sterr came away with medals in the triple and long jumps, and Volmar medaled in the long jump, finishing fifth in the state. Volmar earned a scholarship from St. Thomas University, and pole vaulter Anderson Albury signed with Belmont Abbey College. Coach DiNicola noted proudly that McCarthy's Track and Field team is widely respected by coaches and officials throughout the state for our athletes' sportsmanship and conduct.



Archbishop McCarthy's Women's Basketball team made a great leap forward this season, finishing with a record of 13-11 after winning just three games last year. The team steadily improved throughout their campaign, beating four teams they had lost to earlier in the season.

The soccer team finished with one of its best records in recent years, beating some of their toughest opponents from years past and accomplishing the goals the team set for themselves at the beginning of the season—playing in the District and Regional rounds. "We have continued last year's effort to redefine the soccer program's culture as one in which players took a more serious approach to the game and honored their commitments to their teammates," said Coach Andre Waugh. "We want our players to enjoy a memorable experience and compete with dignity, dedication, and pride."





Year after year, the Lady Mavericks Soccer team distinguishes itself both on the pitch and in the community. Always contenders, the team had another stellar season, winning 16 games (to just 2 losses) and a District Championship, finishing its season as a Regional Semi-finalist. Michaela Carter and Francesca Durand were selected for both the Miami Herald and the Sun-Sentinel All-County First Teams. Three seniors earned scholarships to continue their soccer careers in college: Alisha Avila will play for the University of South Carolina Aiken, Michaela Carter signed with the University of South Florida, and Alicia Pierre will join the St. Thomas University women's soccer team. Equally impressive is the is the team's longtime commitment to serving the community. The Maverick Men's Basketball Team made it to the regional quarterfinals, finishing their season with a record of 21-8. Senior Enrique Duboy became the third Maverick in Archbishop McCarthy history to score 1,000 points. Seniors Guy Twitty and George Sterr were both selected for the Miami-Dade All-Star Game. Coach Alvarez commended his players' effort: "We had a great group of young men who fought hard in every game they played this season."





Coaches Lauren Carver and Danika Pachas had a young team with just three returning players. Despite the lack of experience, the coaches noted that the girls **"played their hearts out at every match."** Senior Andrea Rutois and sophomore Brianna Masaracchio made the First Team of Broward's All-County squad. With 10 players coming back next year, the coaches are confident that the team has a bright future.

The McCarthy Competition Cheerleading squad finished in first place at the Shark Tank Showdown in Bonita Springs; at the state tournament, the team performed a perfect routine with no deductions, earning the highest score in Archbishop McCarthy history. "We are so proud of the athletes on our team," stated Coach Pawloski-Robinson. "The girls persevered throughout the season, overcoming injuries and adversity. They left it all on the mat."

For the second year in a row, the Archbishop McCarthy Legacies Dance team won a national championship at the National Dance Alliance competition in Orlando, Florida.



With more schools and more dancers competing than ever before, the Legacies Dancers knew that they would have to give their best performance to repeat last year's victory. But the dancers refused to let the pressure of tougher competition get to them. Directed by Melanie Cajuso, Madi Rojas, and Jenna Walker, the dancers took home the national title in the Junior Varsity Jazz category. Performing a routine choreographed by Hannah Seitner to the music of Aerosmith's "Don't Wanna Miss a Thing," the Archbishop McCarthy dancers wowed the judges. Assistant Coach Madi Rojas noted, "We went into the final round in second place. But we addressed the critiques the judges had pointed out in the preliminary round, focused on the quality of our performance, and came out winners."



Charlie Morgan, II, does double duty, coaching both the men's and women's wrestling teams. The team finished the season with a record of 8-4, placing second in the Class 2A District 15 team duals. Qualifying for the state competition were Sam Boatwright, Dylan Ibanez, and Maximiliano Munoz-Lysius. Senior Luis Rosa won both the District and Regional championships in his class and also advanced to the state competition. On the women's side, Tala Salao won the District championship and qualified for the state tournament. "I am so proud of this group," said Coach Morgan. "Although we did not accomplish all of our goals, we had a good year. Five of the key cogs in our team machine will graduate in 2024, but I look forward to seeing who takes up the leadership mantle next year."



The Maverick Men's Weightlifters "gave their all, mentally and physically, and had a great year," Coach Heidi Bowser noted appreciatively. Though more than half of the 30 athletes on the team were first-year weightlifters, Archbishop McCarthy won the District Championship in the Olympic category and was runner-up in the Traditional competition. Jordan Castro and Jonathan Reinikainen finished in the top 10 of their weight class at the State Championships.

Not to be outdone, the Women's Weightlifting team of 36 girls, most of whom were new to the sport, also won their District Championship. Jael Jean, Sophia Gonzalez, and Jenna Bowser were individual District Champions. Coach Bowser noted that "the women's team most important accomplishment is that they grew not only physically but also mentally. Confidence and self-empowerment are greater than any trophy."




Under new head coach Shene Disbergen, the Archbishop McCarthy tennis program achieved two firsts: Both the men's and women's teams were runnersup in the District Championships in the same year, and a Maverick reached the semi-final round in the state tournament's individual bracket.





Facing tough competition throughout the season, the men's and women's teams each won four matches while showing "remarkable sportsmanship," according to their coach. Sophomore Jessica McLean, the number one player on the women's team, narrowly lost a thirdset tiebreaker in a state semi-final match. the first individual Maverick to advance that far in the state competition. Coach Disbergen described her first year as head coach at Archbishop McCarthy as an "incredible experience," thanks to the "unwavering support from both the staff and parents."



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Though lacrosse is considered the oldest organized sport in North America, Archbishop McCarthv's women's team was only added in 2016. According to Coach Jim Hill, the 2023-2024 season has been McCarthy's best in its 8-year history. "The team has played schools from Stuart to Key West. Our girls definitely made some noise this year. winning games against teams we've never beaten before." Coach Hill observes. "When our student athletes stick to the plan, they succeed. Working with athletes who excel in the classroom as well as on the field makes coaching a lot easier. The players are a joy to be around." And for the second year in a row, a senior on the team earned an athletic scholarship—Kayley Fardales will play for Palm **Beach Atlantic University next** vear.

First-year Head Coach of the Men's Lacrosse team Mr. Oscar Cifuentes was "super happy" with the performance of his team this season. For the first time in 7 years, the Mavericks reached the District Championship game. Senior Robert Diaz was awarded a scholarship by Florida Southern to play lacrosse at the college level. And Coach Cifuentes is excited about the future of the team, stating that "we have a great group of kids at Archbishop McCarthy, which will enable the program to grow."

At each of the signing ceremonies, Athletic Director Karen Frank introduced each of the athletes, and their coaches attested to their talent, dedication, and hard work. The athletes were also greeted by the thunderous applause and cheers of their McCarthy teammates who witnessed the signings. When asked to comment on their achievement, all of the athletes expressed gratitude to God for blessing them with the talent and opportunity to play their sport, as well as acknowledging their coaches for the instruction





and encouragement they have received over the years. Every athlete expressed deep appreciation for the sacrifices their parents and families made that allowed them to play their sport on school and travel teams. Athletic Director Ms. Frank noted the value that participation in athletics offers, **"Athletics teaches us life lessons that cannot be learned in the classroom."** They have earned the opportunity to continue learning at the collegiate level, and all of us at Archbishop McCarthy are proud of these outstanding Mavericks.
